

THE 1993 AGM REPORT

"OBSERVER"

42 members attended the morning - print talk - by John Abrook FRPS which he entitled "Through my lenses". John's view of photography was probably different to the majority of us but we were treated to a selection of dreamy colour prints depicting mostly flowers (poppies) and water. He uses his camera to portray space, colour and imagination, impression rather than reality. The large number of such prints viewed proved John's dedication to the subject, so much so that his final print was titled "Not another bloody poppy"! Maybe not everyone's favourite subject but it was certainly a thought-provoking talk, backed up by some excellent quality prints.

John was thanked by Stanley Berg.

Last year's AGM heralded changes in the personel running UPP - this year saw the result of those changes with 2 different faces on the front table (though President Mervyn Williams is no stranger to members).

No dramatic change of direction however has been envisaged and nor had it occurred - even to the extent of Circle II claiming pole position again for attendance (10 members), though sharing the honour this year with Circle 2I closely followed by Circle 28 (have to give them a mention!).

A number of apologies were recorded and last years minutes, reported in the Little Man were accepted speedily and with acclamation.

No matters arose, so Mervyn went on to report a quiet year. He had been helped by an efficient and hard-working council and was grateful to them for all their efforts. His particular praise was directed towards the Circle Secretaries, the backbone of the Society and judging by length of service of many, being a Circle Sec ensured a long, happy and contented life! 5 current secretaries have completed more than 20 years in their post and were particularly high-lighted. (See AGM minutes for full details).

Bill Armstrong produced his final edition of the Little Man this summer and his excellent work in establishing the standard of the magazine was praised. Len Holman will be the one twisting arms for contributions and has already started work on the next issue.

Brian Hirschfield has been busy working on an up-date of the history of UPP - a lot has happened since it was last produced 20 years ago, the result is a monumental work of great quality and completeness. A limited number of editions will be printed and circulated.

Secretary Barry Evans highlighted some of the admin matters which had come up during the year. The ever thorny problem of postage costs continues to be looked at by council, though much is down to Circle Secretaries doing what they can.

(cont)

The recent Little Man included an article on the topic, and privatisation of the parcel service, with price increases looming on the horizon. The possibility of a taped commentary to replace the written note-book had been investigated but considered impractical. The question of a fixed term of office for the President was debated but no formal time-scale was felt to be desirable although the term should be "not unduly long". The design of certificates for meritorious service should be completed shortly, the Circle Sec's handbook has already been circulated and publicity notices are available.

Francis Ouvry began his first Treasurers report by acknowledging the work, past and present by his predecessor. Brian's comprehensive computer accounting system is still used and is available for producing the subscription invoices. The first year of stewardship had produced a surplus of £43.87 but that was because stationary of £231 relating to this year was paid for last year. About 34 of the subs were now in but leaving over 100 still to pay. A net decline in the number of members meant reduced income of £157. Council and officer's expenses had increased and although the Little Man still produced a surplus, increasing costs are a factor in causing a subscription increase for 1994/5 - the first in 4 years. Its going up by 11% but that's only £1 (no extra for 2nd or 3rd circles).

The reserves have been built up by Brian, the financial state is healthy and we need to keep that by balancing income and expenses. It was pointed out from the floor that the subs only amounted to about 2 months postage peanuts really! Both the increase and the report were accepted.

There were no challenges to the single nominees for council posts so no vote had been needed - all were elected with individual acclamation. There is still no Publicity Secretary though - any volunteers!

Under A.O.B. Aubrey Greenslade's suggestion for D.I.Y. self adhesive labels for those at the AGM will be taken forward. The strength and cost of various advertisements were discussed mentioning UPP in a letter to a magazine is a good method and costs nothing, (a smile of delight from the Treasurer!).

Sadly the very recent death of Hon, member Hans Hoyer was announced. His funeral had taken place only two days ago, he will be remembered with affection by all those who knew him.

At the projection of the G.L. slides both competition Secretaries made comments concerning the Exhibition. John Butler had encountered problems resulting in damage to some prints because of a delay in 3 of the screens arriving, and then not being suitable to take velcro.

The damage is, of course, regretted but great care is always taken with the prints, even to the extent this year of taking the bromoils home overnight. Bob Scott appealed for slides to be properly mounted so that they do 'not' jam in the projector.

The evening lecture this year was the late afternoon lecture, and it was Clive Tanner FRPS of Circle 8 who rounded off the day at the Poly (sorry University!) with his 2¼ square slides. "Of this and that".

A member of Tonbridge Camera Club and a Fellow of the R.P.S; his speciality groups in the R.P.S, are A.V. and Architectural, it was joining the Architectural group that proved to be a turning point in his photographic career - if nothing it provided an introduction to drinking! Photography is about capturing memories, and this encompasses humour, sadness, education and general enrichment of life. Many will recognise the scenario of the photographer left vards behind the rest of the family who couldn't wait for the photographer to capture the perfect picture. Clive's "A" had been achieved with slides of cathedral architecture, and some superb studies included the cathedrals of York, Wells, Peterborough, Coventry, Manchester, Durham and Southwark - all on the 24 square format which seemed well suited to the subject and all by available light imparting a particular quality. The show included, of course, the actual "A" panel as well as a variety of other subjects and all embodied his philosophy of doing what you like doing as well as you can. No UPP member can identify with the (epocryphal?) American tourist "doing" the UK who was overheard at one well known location - "Shall I take the photo here, or save it for Scotland?"!

Mervyn Williams thanked Clive for a very enjoyable talk which was informal, personal and interesting with an impressive variety of pictures.

And so to dinner...again at the Grafton Hotel but unhurried, giving plenty of time to enjoy the excellent food. Yet again the loyal toast was "drunk" from empty glasses (or are Circle 28 just extra thirsty ?), but missing this year was any comments from the judges. A vote of thanks was nevertheless proposed by Philip Antrobus of Circles 4.19 and 26 who complimented the authors on the quality of the winning pictures and hoped that David Dent would not charge UPP members extra after winning the Leighton Herdson Trophy. He thanked the judges for their judgements, the Competition Secretaries who had overcome logistical problems, the 2 lecturers who had entertained and the organisers of the dinner, greatly improved from the days of the Poly (sorry University) Canteen.

All we need now are some decent sign-posts to help us poor country drivers to find the way out of London again!

JUDGE'S COMMENTS

Warm Work!

It was a warm summer atternoon when we met at the newly named University of Westminster to judge the portfolios. The temperature in the room with the prints was quite high but this was made bearable by the slick organisation and the friendly atmosphere.

The prints passed rapidly before us. disappearing only after our marks had been carefully recorded. The small prints started the 'ball rolling' and there were some very competent prints which showed good quality and excellent technique but there were few outstanding prints and limited imagination. The quality of the winning portrait was excellent, a very pleasing photograph which was closely followed by the Northern Landscape with church. The wide range of subject matter in the different portfolios maintained the interest throughout the judging. There were some fine church interiors in colour, a very good bromiol but I particularly liked the print with the Lowry-like figures and the originality of "Avalon". Both of these prints however were pipped by the superb "Portugese Gentleman", a well deserved winner.

We then experienced a temperature shock when we moved to judge the slides. There was, however no loss of interest or quality in the work that was shown. In general the natural history slides were of a very high standard, including several in the general portfolios which actually provided the winning slide. This shot of a snail was perhaps not the most difficult subject but its composition and excellent quality made it outstanding. I would have liked to see more slides with atmosphere or creativity, I did enjoy the

moving chariots. The overall best slide, in our opinion, which might be considered a natural history picture, scored through its simplicity, high quality and limited but very pleasant range of colours.

I found it a most enjoyable afternoon and wish to congratulate the "winners" and also all those whose work was shown.

MEET THE WINNERS

Leighton Herdson Print Trophy

My photography started as an eleven year old when, having blacked out the bathroom, developed my 120 films in open dishes. I was not satisfied with contact prints for very long and soon 'lashed up' an enlarger out of sweet tins and an old plate camera. (Some might say that things have not changed very much!!).

I progressed steadily until 1966 when I became a founder member of Tonbridge Camera Club. I joined UPP in September 1968, and have enjoyed 25 years as a member of, what must be the friendliest of circles - Circle 10.

In 1986 Leslie and I moved from Kent to the Lake District to develop and open Lakeland Photographic Holidays which we run more as a huge worldwide camera club than a hote!!!

Although I walk the Lakeland fells at least three times a week with our guests I must admit that I have a strong photographic leaning towards 'People' and 'Human interest' shots.

Our own holidays are spent in Portugal each year where we rest-up for five weeks in January/February. Photographically this offers us a complete change from the remaining II months of the year.

My winning shot of the old Portuguese gentleman was taken as we were strolling back to our car from photographing a rural cattle market. He poked his head out from a doorway for only a split second and I instinctively



lifted my camera (Nikon F4), zoomed out to 210mm and pressed the shutter. I heard the camera focus and take - then laughingly said to Leslie that it would be a miracle if anything came of the negative. In my eyes the miracle happened, the negative was as sharp as a pin and beautifully exposed yet difficult to print due to the strong back lighting.

The resulting picture is really a testimony to the auto focus and matrix metering of modern camera systems - plus of course a little help from myself in seeing the shot in the first place and instinctively framing it up in the viewfinder!




